Civic election candidates, in their own words

In all, 45 candidates are taking part in Richmond's civic election, set for Oct. 15.

Three candidates are running for mayor, 27 for councillor, and 15 for school board trustee. Most incumbents are running again, with the exception of Couns. Linda McPhail and Harold Steves and school board trustees Norm Goldstein and Sandra Nixon.

There are seven slates of candidates: ONE Richmond (two councillor candidates), RCCA—Richmond Community Coalition Association (three councillor candidates and four school board trustee candidates), Richmond Citizens (RCA) (four councillor candidates),

Richmond Education Party (six school board trustee candidates), Richmond RISE (two councillor candidates), Richmond United (three councillor candidates and one school board trustee candidate), and RITE Richmond (one mayoral candidate and four councillor candidates). The remaining candidates are running independently.

MAYOR



Name: Malcolm Brodie
Party: Independent
Richmond resident since: 1976

Occupation: Mayor
Why are you running for office? I'm running again to help our city grow responsibly, affordably, and

sustainably—while we still maintain the safe, high quality of life in a city that is managed well now and for future generations.

Top issue in the election and your position? Affordability—we need to continue to work with partners on a full range of housing for families to complement our extensive recreational trails, cycle paths, child care centres, and facilities. We should expand fee subsidies for those who cannot afford recreation programs while we keep average yearly property tax increases among the lowest in the region.



Name: John Roston
Party: RITE Richmond
Richmond resident since: 2007

Occupation: Retired McGill University senior administrator and adjunct professor

Why are you running for office? I'm fed up with the token efforts being made to address the housing crisis and emergency preparedness for the environmental threats brought about by climate change.

Top issue in this election and your position? Housing. We need to attract large developments of 100 per cent purpose-built rental housing to dramatically increase supply to meet demand and provide the economies of scale that keeps rents down. We can also rezone single storey commercial properties to add only 100 per cent rental on top of the ground floor commercial.

NOTICE OF ELECTION

2022 Richmond Election

On Saturday, October 15, 2022, eligible voters in Richmond will be electing one Mayor, eight Councillors, and seven School Trustees. Those elected in October 2022 will serve in office for four years.

Are you eligible to vote?

You may vote as a resident elector if you:

- are a Canadian citizen
- are at least 18 years old on General Voting Day (Saturday, October 15, 2022)
- are a resident of Richmond
- have lived in British Columbia for at least six months before registering to vote
- are not disqualified from voting by law

Non-Resident Property Elector

If you own property in Richmond, but do not live in the City, you may be eligible to vote in the 2022 Richmond Election. Visit richmond.ca/elections to find out more information.

When and where can you vote?

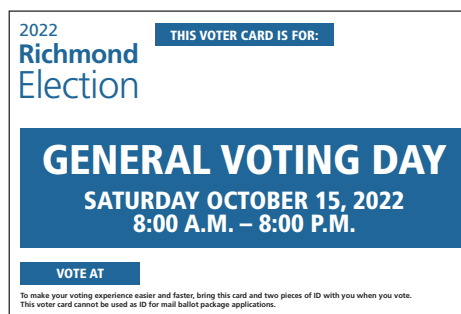
There are three ways you can vote:

1. General Voting Day

General Voting Day is on Saturday, October 15, 2022 from 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. Voting divisions will be used on General Voting Day, which means that you must vote at your designated neighbourhood voting place for your division. If you're a non-resident property elector voting on October 15, you must vote at the designated neighbourhood voting place for the division in which your property is located.

Registered voters will receive a voter card in the mail that will indicate your designated voting place for October 15. A voter card is not necessary to vote. If you did not receive a voter card, you may find out where to vote at richmond.ca/elections, download the Richmond Election app (available on Apple and Android devices), or contact the Richmond Elections Office.

Please come to your voting place prepared. Bring your voter card if you received one, as well as two pieces of ID. One piece must include your signature.

3. Mail Ballot

All existing voters and new registrants will be able to request a mail ballot package. The mail ballot package will include instructions on how to complete and return the mail ballot. Applications for a mail ballot will be available online beginning Wednesday, September 7 until Friday, October 7, 2022, 3:00 p.m. After this date, mail ballot packages can be requested over the phone. Mail ballot packages will be sent out via Canada Post until October 5, 2022. After this date, voters will be asked to pick up their mail ballot packages at Richmond City Hall.

Find out how to request a mail ballot package at richmond.ca/elections, download the Richmond Election app when available or contact the Richmond Elections Office.

How do you register to vote?

First, find out if you are already registered to vote in the 2022 Richmond Election by visiting richmond.ca/elections, checking the Richmond Election app, or contacting the Elections Office.

You can register to vote at your voting place. Please bring at least two valid IDs (identification documents) with you.

If you are a non-resident property elector, please contact the Richmond Elections Office.

What are the options for accessible voting?

If you are a person who has a disability; illness; and/or injury that may affect your ability to vote, you may:

- Bring a friend or family member to assist you with reading or marking your ballot.
- Request to vote by mail.
- Request to use an accessible ballot-marking device available at Richmond City Hall on advance voting dates. Through this option, you may mark your ballot independently using a touchscreen, Braille, rocker paddle device, sip and puff device, and/or descriptive audio.
- Request to have curb-side voting at the voting place. Call the Richmond Elections Office at 604-276-4100 right before you arrive at your voting place.

We strive to ensure that voting locations are accessible for people who use wheelchairs, walkers and mobility scooters; however some locations are not fully accessible. We will ensure curb-side voting is well signed at locations that are not fully accessible.

What if you need help with translation?

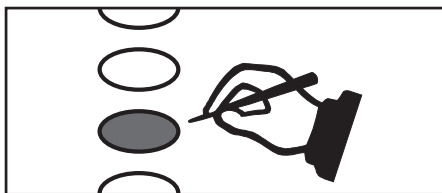
If you need help with translation, you may:

- Bring a friend or family member who will translate for you when you vote.
- Use the translated voting instructions at your voting place available in French, Simplified Chinese, Traditional Chinese, and Punjabi.
- Read voting information in the Voter's Guides translated in French, Simplified Chinese, Traditional Chinese, and Punjabi available at richmond.ca/elections.

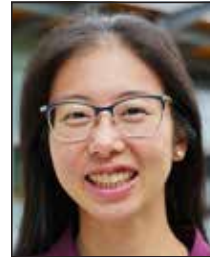

A printed voter's guide will include voting information in addition to the profiles, and will be available at city hall, community centres, and libraries. In addition to a version in English, the voter's guide will be available online in four languages: French, Simplified Chinese, Traditional Chinese, and Punjabi.

Eligible Richmond voters may vote in advance on Oct. 1, 5, 6, 7, and 8, between 8 a.m. and 8 p.m. Alternatively, voters may vote

at their designated voting place on Oct. 15 between 8 a.m. and 8 p.m. Mail ballots will also be available for eligible Richmond voters.

Candidate profiles, a list of all-candidates meetings, and information about designated voting places are available on the 2022 Richmond Election app (which will soon be available on Android and Apple devices) and at richmond.ca/elections. The voter's guide will be sent to all Richmond households, and voter cards are also being sent out.

Each compartment must contain a 'straight,' a set of numbers with no gaps in any order, eg. [4,2,3,5].
