## Richmond's 3rd annual tree sale

The City of Richmond is excited to announce its annual tree sale, providing residents with a unique opportunity to enhance their home gardens and contribute to Richmond's urban forest. This year's sale offers a diverse selection of trees, including new fruit and non-fruit species. With 1,000 trees available at a subsidized price of \$15.00 each, residents can access affordable, high-quality options while contributing to the beautification of their surroundings.

The following nine species are available (chosen for their suitability in Richmond's unique urban environment) on a first come, first served basis:

- assorted apples (M. domestica)
- assorted fruiting cherries (Prunus spp.)
- assorted plums (P. domestica)
- assorted pears (pyrus communis)

- serviceberry (Amelanchier alnifolia)
- vine maple (Acer circinatum)
- kousa dogwood (Cornus kousa)
- persimmon (Diospyros kaki)
- assorted magnolia (Magnolia spp.)

The trees are nursery-grown, come in five-gallon pots and range from three to six feet tall.

#### Purchasing a tree

Trees are being offered to City of Richmond residents only. They may purchase a maximum of two (2) trees per residence. Since Monday, Sept. 9, City of Richmond residents may purchase a maximum of two (2) trees per residence until Friday, Oct. 4 through the MyRichmond online portal.

When purchasing, residents must select a 90-minute time slot for tree pick up day. Visit richmond.ca/TreeSale for available times.

Residents can buy a tree for \$15.00, a subsidized priced set to ensure cost is not a barrier, while also helping to partially offset the city's cost to purchase the trees.

#### Tree pick up

- Date: Saturday, Oct. 5, 2024
- Time: Between 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. (during selected 90 minute time slot)
- Location: City of Richmond Works Yard, 5599 Lynas Lane

Residents will be asked to provide their confirmation receipt and proof of residency at time of pick up.

City staff will provide a tree-planting brochure and planting advice, and will respond to any tree-planting related questions. Pick up will proceed rain or shine.

# New funding strengthens police work

Police in B.C. will soon have more tools to enhance their efforts in protecting children online and strengthen abilities to pursue, disrupt and prosecute offenders.

"Children and youth are spending more time online than ever. Sadly, that increases their vulnerability to predators looking to take advantage of them," said Mike Farnworth, minister of public safety and solicitor general. "Online child exploitation happens every single day, and as social media platforms continue to grow, we must ensure our children are protected from those trying to hurt them. That's why we continue to work with the federal government to equip police with the necessary tools to support units tasked with the very difficult job of investigating these horrendous crimes."

Through the Federal Contribution Program to Combat Serious and Organized Crime, Public Safety Canada has allocated \$3.5 million over three years to B.C. to bolster the efforts of municipal police departments in combating online child sexual exploitation. The funds will be used for staffing, equipment and training, to strengthen investigation capabilities in collaboration with the B.C. RCMP's Internet Child Exploitation (ICE) unit

Many police departments throughout the province complete ICE investigations, but they do not have resources solely dedicated to internet child-exploitation files. Until recently, the Vancouver Police Department was the only independent municipal police department in B.C. with a dedicated

ICE Unit. In 2021 as part of a pilot project, the Victoria, Esquimalt, Saanich, Central Saanich and Oak Bay police departments developed an integrated Capital Regional District (CRD) ICE Team. This funding will increase the capacity of both ICE teams and will enable all municipal police departments to increase the training and capacity of officers conducting ICE investigations. This will allow for more ICE investigations, and will help support efforts to raise awareness, reduce stigma around reporting, and increase B.C. and Canada's ability to pursue and prosecute offenders.

Reported incidents of online exploitation rose significantly during the COVID-19 public-health emergency and has continued post-pandemic. B.C. ICE has noted a substantial increase in reports of exploitation incidents, such as child luring, grooming and child sexual exploitation material with more than 28,000 investigations opened between 2020 and 2023.

In September 2024, the province will host a one-day forum featuring experts from the B.C. ICE Unit, and other relevant police investigators, B.C. Prosecution Service and Community Safety and Victim Services that will engage in roundtable discussions about finding solutions to keep children safe online. The discussions will focus on "sextortion" in B.C., family perspectives from people affected by this violence, a national perspective, prevention, education and training resources, and supports for victims affected by exploitation.

## Annual rent increases for 2025 will be tied to inflation

The province is tying the annual allowable rent Increase in 2025 to inflation at 3 per cent, down from this year's allowable increase of 3.5

"Tving the allowable increase to inflation saves renters hundreds of dollars, over the previous government's policy of inflation plus 2 per cent," said Ravi Kahlon, minister of housing. "At a time when we know renters are struggling, our rent cap protects renters against unfair rent hikes, while allowing landlords to meet rising costs so that rental homes can stay in B.C.'s housing market."

The maximum annual allowable rent increase for 2025 cannot take effect prior to Jan. 1, 2025. Government policy prior to 2018 allowed for an additional 2 per cent rent increase on top of inflation, costing the average B.C. family hundreds of dollars in additional rent.

Since 2017, the province has taken steps to better protect renters, including banning illegal renovictions, strengthening the financial penalties for landlords who evict tenants in bad faith, protecting growing families by restricting rent increases if a tenant adds a child under 19 to their household, and improving wait times at the Residential Tenancy Branch by 64 per cent since November 2022.

In addition, the province has implemented the annual renter's tax credit, which provides \$400 a year to low- and moderate-income renters across B.C., and is the first Canadian jurisdiction to support the creation of provincewide rent bank services to provide interest-free loans for tenants in urgent circumstances.

Next year's change follows multiple years of the province capping the annual allowable increase well below inflation in 2023 and 2024, as well as a rent increase freeze in 2020 and 2021 to support renters during the COVID-19 pandemic. It represents a return to the standard formula of tying allowable rent increases in B.C. to the Consumer Price Index, as inflation begins to return to more

"Tying the annual allowable rent increase to inflation is consistent with the recommendations from the Rental Housing Task Force to support renters and ensure that rental homes can stay available for renters," said Spencer Chandra Herbert, premier's liaison for renters and MLA for Vancouver West End. "Capping rent increases to inflation has saved families and households in B.C. thousands of dollars since 2017, as we have eliminated the old government's automatic 2 per cent rent increase on top of inflation."

To further support renters amid more frequent and severe heat waves, the Residential Tenancy Branch has recently updated information related to the outright banning of air-conditioning (AC) units and passive cooling materials without a rational basis. This updated information provides examples of specific cooling measures, such as umbrellas, awnings, and reflective window coverings, and is intended to make the rules clearer for landlords and tenants. The province encourages tenants with questions about adding AC units or passive cooling materials to their homes to speak with their landlord. If a resolution can't be reached, a Residential Tenancy Branch information officer at 1-800-665-8779 can outline options.





# In honour of our soldiers: Bernard Joy Moffatt

In a series of Richmond's 'poppy' street signs in memory of our fallen soldiers, we share the story of Moffatt Road. Bernard Joy Moffatt was born in Fernie BC, Dec.13, 1917.

He later moved to Richmond in 1932 with his mother, Amy, and his sister Ann Sheila. When his father, Arthur John Moffatt, was appointed Municipal Clerk of Richmond.

Bernard attended Richmond High School, leaving in 1935 with his Junior Matriculation. After a short term at UBC, he joined the firm of Barrett-Lennard accountants in Vancouver, as an articled clerk.

Upon enlistment in the Royal Canadian Air Force in Vancouver, on Feb. 12, 1941, Bernard was posted in MB, AB, and PEI for training.

He went home on leave in July 1941 to find that his family had moved to Victoria for the duration of the war. He

embarked for England in April 1942 after receiving his commission on Dec. 25. 1941.

He initially spent some time ferrying planes across the Atlantic. By October 1942, he was stationed in Malta. At the time of his death, he was a part of the #69 RAF Squadron when his Wellington aircraft went missing on Nov. 10, 1942, when it failed to return from operations. His legacy will continue to live on in Moffatt Road between Gilbert and No. 3 roads.

# Connor Emeny, Ironman Global quest

or Connor Emeny, there are seemingly no limits. Having set a World Record for becoming the youngest person ever to complete an Ironman competition on six continents at 26 years of age—he felt compelled to next set his sights one level higher by tackling the foreboding and ominous terrain of Antarctica.

The idea of even doing an Ironman came about in 2016 after a friend pulled off such a feat.

"I just couldn't comprehend it," he says of the triad of events that involves swimming 3.9km, biking 180km and running 42.2km.

"All in one day—it sounded simply impossible.

 $\ensuremath{^{\prime\prime}}\xspace$  l was shocked and inspired at the same time.

"I never heard of the sport before that or knew anyone who did something that intense and when I Googled Ironman, it said it was the hardest single day sporting event on the planet.

Having always been of a competitive nature, Emeny texted that friend eight years ago to offer congratulations, but with a caveat "I said "Thanks for the inspiration"; I too will do an Ironman by 2020. "I knew it would take me that long to train for it and so that's what I did... my first Ironman, New Zealand in 2020".

Little did he know then that would lead him on an Ironman guest around the globe.

The Ironman is an intense competition; consisting of three equally-grueling disciplines. And for the competitors, each element contains its own challenges.

"For me, swimming was not natural," says Emeny. "Swimming took me a long time to learn and is something that requires a lot of attention to detail to get good at.

"I remember I could barely swim 3 or 4 laps without being out of breath so I actually self-taught myself on YouTube by watching tutorials on open water swimming, learning techniques, tips and tricks for getting faster.

"Biking came more naturally and I grew up running".

Having achieved the goal of completing an Ironman, Emeny decided to raise the bar and not only go again, but compete on all four corners of the

"I wanted to leave a legacy for my family and do something truly remarkable with my life," he says.

"A Triathlon has never been completed on all seven continents and when I was completing my 6th race in Brazil, I was constantly thinking: What's Next.

"The idea wouldn't leave my mind.

"The difference between Antarctica and all the others was, this time, it's not a race—no 2000 competitors to encourage you, fans to hype you up or aid stations to refuel.

It's just me and Mother Nature in the most remote and coldest continent in the world. That global goal was accomplished earlier this year.

"On Feb. 21, 2024 I completed the world first feat of an Iron-Distance Triathlon on all seven continents. Suffice it to say it was no easy task.

"Swimming 3.9km in ice water; riding 180km on a Fat tire bike and running a marathon in the most remote place on earth, was grueling.

"It took me just over 32 hours of non-stop effort to complete".

When all was said and done, Emeny had achieved a seemingly unreachable goal, but became a record holder in the process. "The feeling of accomplishment was overwhelming yet fleeting." he says.

"For a brief moment I felt on top of the world; seeing through a dream.

"Shortly after, I felt lost and empty because I had so much purpose on that quest.

"I woke up every day knowing exactly what I was

working towards and in retrospect, that's the real joy of life: the daily grind and journey towards a goal; not actually achieving it.

"But after some time of feeling lost, I knew I needed a new goal to work towards and the fire was reborn with the idea of Antarctica. So again, I went ALL IN on the dream".

Antarctica is massive, desolate and the land mass is bigger than Africa and Europe combined.

"Being down there surrounded by penguins, whales and icebergs 60 meters tall makes you feel so small," says Emeny.

"It's humbling and magical at the same time".

Not one to rest on his laurels, the affable triathalete is busily engaged on an extension of his worldwide feat.

"We are working on a documentary titled *Chasing Antarctica* to share with the world," he says.

"It's a story of human endurance, self-belief and power of community".

As for Emeny's next challenge—it appears to be the most adventurous yet.

"I have my eyes set on the World's Toughest Row—3000 miles across the Pacific Ocean, which takes on average 45 days to complete".

It's remarkable to witness the lengths some go to in life; to test their limits and never rest on their laurels.

Emeny is one such example of the human spirit.

"This journey has taught me anything is possible if you believe," he says.

"It's taught me the power of teamwork, resilience and leadership.

The world needs more dreamers now than ever so I challenge people around me to Dare to Dream and do whatever it takes to make it happen.

"I hope my journey and life is a living example of what it means to go ALL IN and helps spark purpose in those around me".

It's an inspiring story to be certain.

#### VIEW #2 - You Gotta Believe



Often, the alert will contain information on the vehicle that abducted the child or children. which leads us to the new film, Amber Alert. Jag (Hayden Panettiere, who gained international fame

in two TV series, Heroes and Nashville) receives an Amber Alert during her Uber ride and she and her driver, Shane (Tyler James Williams), discover they are right behind, what they believe, is the kidnapper's car. For the viewer, the reaction is instant: you instantly call the police, but how far would you go in pursuit when the authorities are not close by? A cat-and-mouse game follows. Another of our favourites, character actor, Kevin Dunn, rounds out the cast. Amber Alert is in theatres and available for home viewing Sept 27.

### Maui welcomes back Hawaii Food and Wine Festival

In early August of 2023 we sat across from Shelley Kekuna, the executive director of Ka'anapali Beach Resort Association, in a restaurant in Vancouver. It had been a very difficult 24 hours for her and for the place she loves, the island of Maui. Just the day before, wildfires swept across the Island and all but destroyed the town of Lahaina.

This festival is Hawaii's largest food and wine festival and brings together more than 150 global tastemakers, Michelin-starred chefs, celebrated winemakers and master mixologists, to showcase the best of Hawaii's local ingre-

Festival ticket purchases go towards supporting the farmers, ranchers, and fishermen of Hawaii, as well as investing in the up-and-coming chef talent at local culinary colleges and agricultural education for children. Vancouver will be well represented by the Executive Chef of Blue Water Café, Frank Pabst. It was at Blue Water Café that we sat down with Shelley Kekuna and Chef Frank.

OCT: Shelley, we were with you a year ago when this tragedy was actually taking place on Maui and in the town of Lahaina, but you're back this year to talk about the festival and the money that will be raised at the festival, please tell our readers more.

SK: We have just passed our one-year mark since the fire. This wonderful Hawaii Food and Wine Festival is run by a non-profit, probably the only one we know of when it comes to food and wine festivals, so it's not only important to Maui but all the islands because of all the charitable contributions that's fed back into the communities.

This really is an event where locals and visitors will all come together and enjoy the wonderful food and wine, and as you said, raise money. Tell us about some of the great things taking place during the Maui portion of the festival on Oct. 25 to 27 which includes a golf tournament, an afternoon barbecue and a pickle ball tournament.

> SK: This will be the first pickle ball tournament included in the festival portfolio and that will be on Sunday, Oct. 27. Friday Oct. 25 is the golf tournament, it's a very successful sold-out tournament with great chefs at all the holes providing food for all the players, and sponsored by Southern Wine and Spirits. On Sat. 26, we will do a big walk around event at the Sheraton Maui Resort and Spa. It's a great resort, beautiful outdoor property.

> We'll have ten fantastic chefs and in the centre of all the chefs will be a hollow square that will be full of fabulous wines. We'll have mixologists, live

music, and fireworks at the end of the night. This year, we offer "Vita La Vino", a Mediterranean-Italian themed event on the Saturday. Sunday is the pickle ball tournament which will be lots of fun, followed by a backyard barbecue, which will include another five chefs, including Chef Ming Tsai, all providing fabulous barbeque delights. Again, all these events feed to local charities.

A lot of people are asking how they can help Maui, and this festival is a wonderful way to help. You can combine your vacation while supporting this festival, which will support our local charities. We are excited to welcome everyone back.

OCT: Hawaii is such a popular destination for Canadians, especially people in B.C. and other parts of Western Canada. We love Ka'anapali and we have been there a number of times. One of the things we love is that you can park the car and not have to drive again until you leave. Everything in Ka'anapali is walkable.

SK: Ka'anapali is a great place, it truly is where the world comes to play.

OCT: One of the elite invited chefs from Vancouver will be attending the festival and we asked Executive Chef of Blue Water Restaurant, Frank Pabst, what he was looking forward to the most, at the upcoming festival.

FP: First of all, I am very honoured to be invited to this exclusive event and I am looking forward to sharing my joy and happiness about the fact that this event is able to happen this year. I am looking forward to seeing all the people enjoying the great food and all the amazing wine that will be available. Overall, I am excited to get together with all the friends and families and having a great time during this celebration in Maui.


